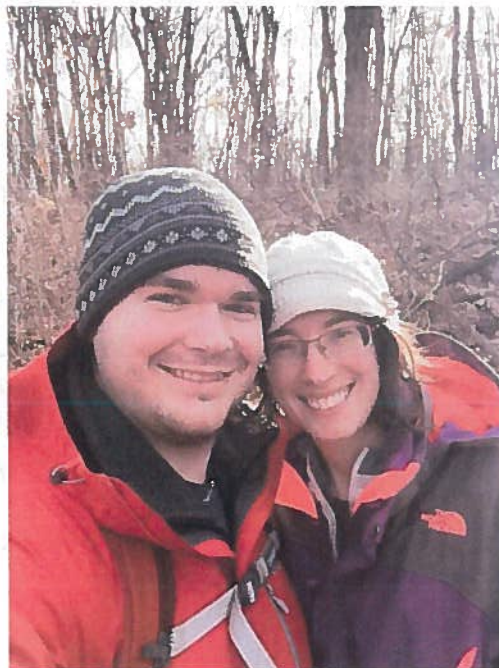

## **GREETINGS FROM OUR NEW RECTOR, REV. KAY HOUCK**

Beloved in Christ,

My heart is full and my spirit rejoices! Over the course of this year I have delighted in getting to know the wonderful people of Emmanuel's Rector Search Committee and Vestry. Now I eagerly anticipate learning your stories, developing trust among us, and sharing in the fellowship of this beautiful faith community. To begin building a connection between us, I offer you a little bit of background information about my life:

I am the child of a Navy family, so I moved six times before the age of ten. My parents were both born in Western New York, so after my dad retired from the Navy, we settled in Baldwinsville, just outside of Syracuse. My faith blossomed within a community that highly valued youth formation, and eventually my ordination to the diaconate took place at my home parish.



I had imagined that I would become a pediatrician, so I enrolled at Florida Southern College intending to follow the pre-med track. I graduated in 2006 with a degree in Biology and a minor in Religion. It was during my

sophomore year of college that I began to discern my call to ordained ministry, and I went on to receive a Master of Divinity from Seabury-Western Theological Seminary in 2009.

I spent a year interning at St. James' Episcopal Church in Pulaski, New York, where I was blessed with an incredible mentor whose ministry was informed by both deep spiritual wisdom and playfulness. My internship was followed by diaconate ministry at St. Mark the Evangelist in Syracuse, New York, and in 2012 I accepted a Priest-in-Charge position at a lovely country church in Windsor, New York. There I began to channel my own creativity in ministry, as my caring community helped shape my priesthood. Then, in 2015 I began my call as Priest-in-Charge at Trinity Episcopal Church in Lexington, Michigan. Matthew and I celebrated our marriage that same year, and for the past five years we (our beloved Australian Kelpie included) have made our home in the "Thumb."

It has been a whirlwind month as we have said our goodbyes to the dear people of Trinity, searched for a new home, and looked forward to the new path we are joining with all of you!

I realize our transition will be different from the ones we have experienced in the past. I have not entered a new call in a pandemic, and you have not received a Rector in a pandemic (at least not in recent history). However, I trust we will make our way through with the same love and faithfulness I witnessed in your Vestry and Search Committee throughout the search process. Together we will rely on God's grace, a spirit of wonder and curiosity, and healthy sense of humor.

Undoubtedly, this season of pandemic has been strange and unsettling in many ways. Yet, when I look to the bigger picture, I see how this season has also revealed the powerful heart of community.

Yes, we have felt disoriented at times. But, we have navigated through uncertainty with hope and compassion. Our faith communities have glimmered with God-light in our care for one another. We have modeled love of neighbor. We have been creative and adaptive in proclaiming the Word and connecting in prayer. In all of it, we have harnessed the resilience born of faith and the power of the Holy Spirit. And our ministry continues.

I am grateful, humbled, and honored to join you in the holy work of community.

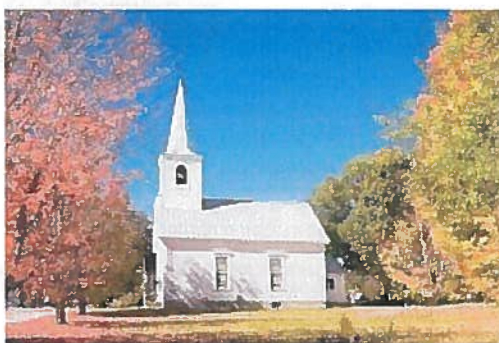


### **BOOKS AND BEYOND NEWS**

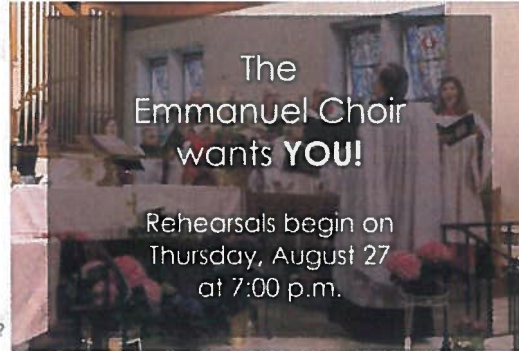

### Five reasons why YOU need to be in the Emmanuel Church Choir

Are you a shower crooner with a secret desire to sing in public? Maybe you've been toying with the idea of joining the Emmanuel Choir? Or perhaps you'd love to sing but were always told you don't have a voice? Here are five good reasons why taking the plunge and joining a choir might be the best thing you ever did...

#### Musicality

It's official: singing in a choir improves the way you hear music, it draws out your innate musical ability and intensifies your appreciation of harmony. There is a natural learning curve that occurs quite organically as a consequence of singing regularly in a group that strengthens your ear. Where choral singing is concerned, the whole really is the sum of its parts, and choir members soon become aware of how harmonies combine and complement each other.

#### Mental Health

Professor Grenville Hancox, Director of the Sidney de Haan Research Centre for Arts and Health in Kent, has done extensive research on the benefits of choral singing on psychological well-being. He is so passionate about the enormous emotional benefits of choral singing, he has been trying to persuade the medical profession to prescribe singing instead of Prozac:

**"If we could engage more and more people in singing, I'm sure we would have a healthier nation."**

Studies have shown that the mental health benefits of choral singing include enhanced brain function, strengthened feelings of togetherness, and the release of endorphins and oxytocin resulting in reduced stress and depression.

#### Confidence

It's surprising how many people are told at school they can't sing, a myth that can discourage potential singers for decades. Most people don't imagine they will ever perform in front of an audience, and to experience this for the first time as part of a choir can be life changing. The truth is that, unless there is hearing loss, anyone can learn to sing. Singing in a choir gives you permission to make noise as part of group, and choir leaders report witnessing new members' confidence grow rapidly.

#### Belonging

The modern world is one where people are increasingly isolated. Social media networks offers a semblance of community but the lack of contact with people in real time and space can intensify feelings of alienation. Singing has been central to religion and ritual as a way of connecting communities since ancient times. Being part of a group working towards a shared endeavor can fulfil this human need for belonging and union.

Recent research reveals that group singing helps forge social bonds, and it does so particularly quickly, acting as a powerful icebreaker. People feel valued and inevitably make friends with individuals from a diversity of backgrounds, so horizons are broadened and social cohesion is improved.

#### Aerobic and toning

A proper singing session is a wonderful workout for the lungs. The actions of warming up, breathing deeply and opening the diaphragm all oxygenate the blood, creating more white blood cells, which strengthens the whole body. The breathing rate slows and deepens, releasing endorphins and increasing a profound sense of well-being. All this lung action reduces the chance of illness and is excellent for people who suffer asthma, and emphysema.

Singing also improves your posture and tones your stomach muscles – a strong core supports the spine so your body will be less prone to injury as you age.

**So, what are you waiting for?**

What a journey this has been! On behalf of the Rector Search Committee, we thank you for charging us with the important task of finding the next Rector

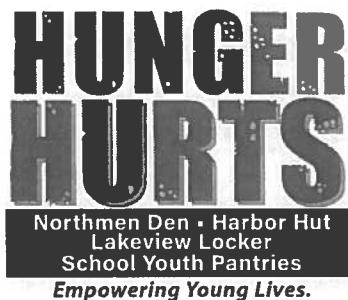

Rather than actually shopping at the Northmen Den this year, a student will fill out a weekly Grocery Order Form with all the foods/toiletries/school supplies for their Northmen Den Food Bag for the weekend. Volunteers will then make the bags at Emmanuel's Woods Family Hall each Friday morning.

All Northmen Den orders will be delivered to the Middle & High School on Friday with our Angels Dressed as Volunteers distributing them to the students.

**VOLUNTEERS NEEDED ARE:**

1. Online Shoppers are ordering from home a standard list of items at Walmart, Meijer's, or Amazon that will be reordered each week using our Youth Pantry credit card. Orders will be delivered to the church.
2. Volunteers are needed to stock the shelves when orders arrive.
3. On Friday morning, volunteers are needed to pack the student's requests.
4. Volunteers are needed to deliver bags to the Middle and High Schools by 1 p.m.
5. Volunteers will distribute the Northmen Den Grocery Bags to the students at a designated area. We are sure students will be excited and relieved to know we have not forgotten them.

The whole process will follow all COVID-19 Health Guidelines. Both Jon Wilcox, Middle School Principal, and Deidre Gamble, High School Principal, emailed us back with a big YES when receiving our proposal.

Christ is calling us once again Emmanuel, to put our prayers into action by heeding that 9 year- old child's message to us in the summer of 2016:

"I will go home and get more food for the children who are hungry."
